# Educators Facilitate – Students Execute

 Key Idea: Educators Shape the Experience – Students Bring It to Life  
The audience experiences.





 Educators design the roadmap– Planning, guiding, coaching

 Students bring it to life – Execute, engage, and adapt

 Audience feels the experience

 Great performances aren't just played—they're shared. Build moments that invite the audience in.

# Start with Purpose (The Why)

-  Facilitator Role:
- Why are students doing this?
  - Ask to student:
    - Who is your audience?
    - What is this piece about?
    - What do you want the audience to feel?
-  Outcome: Purpose-driven preparation leads to deeper student engagement and stronger performances.
-  Final Insight:
  -  What emotional response do we want from our audience?

# Connect It Back – "What Are We Willing to Do?"

- ✓ Educators set the tone and are the expert performers, musicians, and educators.
- ✓ What do we know about our group? And the audience?
- ✓ What cultural or stylistic expectations might they have?
- ✓ What are we, as performers, willing to do to meet them halfway?

- This last part is important—engagement can be cultural. Every group, every audience, every performance has different challenges—understanding this helps us create meaningful connections.




## 🛑 Your Performance, Your Choice!

Not every idea works for every group. If you don't feel comfortable with something, don't force it—find what fits your performance and your audience!

# Set the Stage – “What Makes a Performance Engaging?”

- Before diving into brainstorming, ask:
  - ✓ Think of a performance you loved—what did the performer DO to engage you?
  - ✓ Think of a performance that lost your attention. Why?
  - ✓ What do you think audiences want from a performance?
- This helps frame engagement as an active choice, not an accident. It also connects their role as performers to what the audience experiences.

# Student Brainstorming: How Can You Be More Engaging?





-  What would YOU like to do to bring energy to this performance?
-  What would help the audience feel more connected?
-  Facilitator Role:
  - Help students filter ideas so they stay purposeful and align with the piece.
  - Frame suggestions within the constraints of the performance (e.g., movement should be rehearsed, narration should be brief and clear).
  - Guide them to consider what fits the audience and concert setting.

# Know Your Audience

- 🎯 Key Idea: Tailoring performances to specific audiences builds engagement.
- ✅ Facilitator Role:
- Audience discussion: Who are they? What do they expect?
- Brainstorming: How do we make the repertoire accessible?
- Define/suggest for younger students,
- Open/for experienced students/groups
- 🎤 Did today's rehearsal connect with the intended audience?



# Planning the Concert Experience

-  Key Idea: Structure and flow create a more immersive audience experience.
-  Facilitator Role:
  - Create a story board/flowchart
  - Develop a theme (e.g., A Journey Through Seasons).
  - Assign roles (e.g., narrators, stage managers, transition leaders). Rehearse transitions, including narrations, silence, applause breaks, and movement.
-  Outcome: Students take ownership of the performance, ensuring polished transitions and audience engagement.
-  Which transition felt the most natural? How can we improve others?

# Connecting with the Audience

💡 Key Idea: Confidence, stage presence, and interactive elements enhance audience connection.

✅ Strategies:

- Rehearse confident entrances, exits, and instrument movements
- Use posture, movement, and facial expressions that match the music.
- Incorporate interactive elements (narration, gestures, call-and-response).

🎯 Outcome: Professionalism, confidence, and stronger audience engagement.

💡 Are your body language, expressions, and engagement as powerful as the music itself.

# Review Stage Presence and Audience Interaction

- 🎯 Key Idea: Confidence and visual engagement start before the first note.
  - ✅ Facilitator Role:
  - Rehearse entrances, exits, and acknowledgments 🎭
  - Use video playback to analyze posture & expression 🎥
  - Teach audience engagement techniques (clap-alongs, gestures, eye contact) 👁️
- 🎤 What did we notice about our body language? Did it enhance or distract?

# Amplifying Emotional Peaks

✓ Facilitator Role:

Identify & mark climactic moments in scores 🎵

Experiment with phrasing, dynamics, and tempo 🎶

Rehearse emotional transitions for impact 💡

📌 Key Idea: Emotional shaping makes performances memorable.

✂ Steps:

- Identify peak moments in the music.
- Experiment with phrasing, dynamics, and tempo to emphasize them.
- Ensure smooth transitions into and out of emotional peaks.

🎯 Outcome: Performances resonate emotionally, leaving a lasting impact.

🎤 How did your performance communicate emotion? How can we improve?

# Incorporate Multidisciplinary Elements

## ✅ Facilitator Role:

Identify what is realistic to use( what do you own and use)

Assign roles

Help students identify how and when to use (Video, picture collage, etc.)💡

🚩 Key Idea: Experiment with live media/social media use

## ✂ Ideas:

- Collaborate with Art or Theater department to create visuals or projections
- Experiment with staging, lighting
- Discuss how each item could enhance or distract from performance

🎯 Outcome: Immediate and continued interaction with community

🗣 What media tools do we already use in everyday life? How can we leverage them for deeper audience connection? Like, share, subscribe, poll questions “live”

🗣 How do we balance creative elements with time constraints? What will have the most impact?

# After the Performance

 Key Idea: Evaluate strengths and areas for improvement

 Activities:

- Quick guided discussion: What worked well?
- What is one specific action that made a difference today?
- How can we apply this to the next performance?
- Use simple checklists

 Outcome: Students develop critical thinking, self-awareness, and continuous improvement.

# Final Thoughts

- ✓ Educators facilitate. Students execute. The audience experiences.
- ✓ Moments create meaning—make every performance intentional.
- ✓ Engagement & technique go hand in hand.
- Music is more than notes—it's about connection.
- Engagement enhances execution—build technical skills through storytelling and purpose.
- Audience interaction matters—help students feel the energy of their listeners.
